? Highlights From the 2025 List

? **California Institute of the Arts (CalArts) – Valencia, California**

Just north of Los Angeles, CalArts offers costume design students the perfect mix of creative freedom and proximity to Hollywood. The school's legacy dates back to its **Chouinard Art Institute roots**, where icons like **Edith Head and Bob Mackie** trained. Today, CalArts stays true to Walt and Roy Disney's vision of cross-disciplinary learning, ensuring costume designers learn alongside musicians, animators, and filmmakers.

? **Carnegie Mellon University – Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania**

Carnegie Mellon's costume design program is one of the most respected in the world. With conservatory-style training, students gain hands-on experience across **theater, dance, opera, film, television, video gaming, and themed entertainment**. The curriculum blends **traditional techniques like draping and illustration with modern tools like digital concept art**, ensuring graduates are prepared for Broadway, Hollywood, or beyond.
