Speaking about his inspiration, Kabra shared, "I was intrigued by balancing Indian richness with Eastern simplicity. The modern woman wants comfort and sophistication without compromise, and Senkei mirrors that pace."

The showcase also reflected Kabra's evolving philosophy: moving beyond costumes into **versatile occasion wear** that women can mix, match, and style as self-expression. His vision redefines festive fashion—globally influenced, rooted in Indian craft, yet refined for today's lifestyle.

If Senkei were a mood, Kabra likens it to the burning of camphor—"pure, strong, and deeply spiritual."
