## **When Art Meets Couture**

Passi admits she leans on a few trusted names when she wants something that "can never go wrong." For timeless yet striking staples, she cites **Valentino** and **Dolce & Gabbana**. In India, she respects designers like Manish Malhotra and Rohit Gandhi + Rahul Khanna.
