

Pantone's 2026 Colour of the Year Is "Cloud Dancer" — A Quiet White for a Noisy World

In a surprising move, Pantone has announced **Cloud Dancer (PANTONE 11-4201 / 17-1230)** as its Colour of the Year for 2026 — marking the first time a shade of white has been given the honour since the tradition began.

Described by the Pantone Color Institute as a “lofty white neutral whose aerated presence acts as a whisper of calm and peace in a noisy world,” Cloud Dancer is envisioned as a blank canvas — one that encourages clarity, simplicity and fresh beginnings.

Why White?

According to Pantone, the selection reflects a broader cultural desire to retreat from overstimulation and rediscover quiet reflection. Cloud Dancer is meant to offer respite amid “the cacophony that surrounds us,” fostering focus, creativity and calm.

As a structural colour, the shade is designed to act as a foundation — a versatile backdrop that lets other colors and designs stand out while exuding softness and lightness.
